# Update provided by Chuck Pierce, CPA, MOCPA government relations consultant

## Session Update

Both chambers worked on difficult legislation last week. The Senate is moving along so far without the controversy seen in recent years, passing both difficult and routine legislation so far. Several of the bills passed have been issues that are of interest to MOCPA members.

Last week, both chambers took up complex legislation and worked through the issues without major controversy. The House passed a bill that allows the state to name a special prosecutor for certain violent crimes if the local prosecutor does not act. While this legislation applies to all political subdivisions, it was no secret that the primary target of the legislation was the City of St. Louis. This issue had been worked on during the interim by a working group of legislators. It received intensive debate during the committee process. When the final product came to the floor, there was substantial debate and several amendments, but at the end the House passed the bill.

Last session, the issue of guidance for school curriculum plagued the Senate. Although this was a priority of several Senators, a consensus bill did not make it to the Senate floor last session. Last week, the Senate passed a bill addressing this issue. Although the bill passed mostly along party lines, it represented enough of a compromise that it was not filibustered.

In recent sessions, issues like the one above have resulted in a virtual shutdown of the Senate. Senators tied up the floor debate either trying to advance or block debate on these types of issues. Last week's vote shows what many hope to be a new Senate that will work to compromise on member's priorities without filibuster.

As a result of this new attitude in the Senate, it passed several noncontroversial bills last week. The following bills of interest to MOCPA passed the Senate:

 $\cdot$  <u>SB3</u>—Establishes provisions relating to the start of new businesses.

 $\cdot$  <u>SB25</u>—Authorizes an income tax deduction for federal grants received for the expansion of broadband.

· <u>SB100</u>—Creates and modifies provisions relating to gold and silver.

 $\cdot$  <u>SJR3</u>—Allows voters to authorize the Legislature to establish taxing digital products. If approved by voters, it would still require legislation to establish any new taxes.
